Faith formation is connected to and increases with hospitality.


Faith heritage impacts Christians' beliefs and practices for the long term.

Whose Faith Influenced You?




n=725 U.S. practicing Christian adults who grew up with someone who influenced their faith and who did not inherit their faith from birth, April 5–11, 2018.

Vibrant

These households talk about God or faith together weekly, pray together every day or two and read the Bible together weekly. They do not welcome non-family visitors at least several times a month.


Dormant



Models of Faith & Spiritual Vibrancy Part 1





Distribution of Household Types in This Study





% of teens who say they have done this activity with this member of their household or extended household in the past month



% of teens who say they are most likely to go to this member of their household or extended household for...



Who Teens Talk To


% of teens who say they are most likely to talk with this member of their household or extended household about...





Vibrant

These households talk about God or faith together weekly, pray together every day or two and read the Bible together weekly. They do not welcome non-family visitors at least several times a month.


Dormant






Household Types by Spiritual Vibrancy



A congregation is only as strong as the households that comprise it.



How Can We View Our Ministry with a Multi-Household Mindset?

- 1. Determine the variety and quantity of household types that make up your congregation
- 2. Evaluate ministry offerings from the perspective of the various life stages of the household members
- 3. Consider ways to address obstacles which prevent certain household types from attending corporate events
- 4. Create ministry touchpoints for households as they evolve and change categories



How Can We Model the Importance of Vibrancy to Our Congregations?

- 1. Teach the importance of spiritual vibrancy in church messages and programs
- 2. Narrate everyday household experiences as vital to discipleship and spiritual vibrancy
- 3. Speak to the responsibility of parents and guardians in guiding the next generation toward faith



How Does a Household-Inclusive Mindset Impact Age-Specific Ministries?

- 1. Evaluate the effectiveness of age-separation in your current events and programs
- 2. Create opportunities for older adults and younger single adults to be meaningfully involved in the life and leadership of the congregation



How Can We Coach Christians in Ways Their Upbringing Did Not?

- 1. Emphasize and model the importance of households, relationships, and rituals in new member classes.
- 2. Provide coaching on the importance and meaning of congregational rituals
- 3. Provide coaching to all congregants on how to establish meaningful household rituals
- 4. Coach adults with various faith heritages by building community and nurturing faith roots



How Can We Help Christians Understand the Importance of Household Activities to Faith Formation?

- 1. Identify and validate faith formation opportunities better experienced within the household context instead of the congregational context
- 2. Promote healthy household interactions and activities as a vital component of spiritual vibrancy
- 3. Explore the concepts of "life as worship" and the spirituality of the average and everyday within congregational programs and messages



How Can We Help Christians Understand the Importance of Household Activities to Faith Formation?

- 4. Communicate the importance of expressing joy, hospitality and openness in both the congregational and household contexts
- 5. Promote an understanding of what it means for a Christian to extend *and* receive hospitality
- 6. Encourage activities that include the "extended household"
